ENGLISH HONOURS SELECTION TEST (EHSET), 2022

NOTICE

- The English Honours Selection Test (EHSET), 2022, will be held in the offline mode tentatively on the 7th day from the declaration of Class XII results by AHSEC. 30% of the seats will be reserved for other Boards/ Councils that will be filled up post declaration of results. However, the candidates from other Boards/ Councils will have to take the test on the same specified date. No separate test will be held for them.
- The Candidates are required to **upload their marksheets within 72 hours from the declaration of results**. (The same applies to candidates from other Boards/ Councils apart from AHSEC on declaration of their results)
- The EHSET will be conducted in a venue to be specified later on, tentatively from 1pm to 3 pm.
- There will be a single question paper of **60 marks**. Candidates will have **2 hours** in which to answer the questions. **This paper will constitute 75% of the total evaluation criteria.**
- The question paper will basically comprise of questions meant to test language, vocabulary and grammatical skills through comprehension type questions and free composition.
- Non reserved category candidates who have scored a minimum of 65% marks in aggregate and 75% marks in General English at the +2 level will be eligible to sit for the Test. For candidates seeking reservation against SC/ST/DA categories, will have to fulfill the criteria of minimum 60% in aggregate and 70% in General English. Reservation of Core (Honours) seats will be as per government rules.
- The Candidates who fail to secure the minimum aggregate marks along with the General English score as specified will automatically be disqualified from taking the EHSET.
- The EHSET 2022 results will be declared tentatively in the College website on the fourth day from the date of the Test (exact date to be specified later).
- Candidates are **not allowed to carry mobile phones**, **electronic gadgets**, **smart watches**/ **bands** inside the Examination Hall.
- **†** Further details of the EHSET, 2022 will be notified at the time of announcement of the Test date.

- **♦** All admissions will be provisional and subject to the production of original HS Final/ Class XII mark sheet, application acknowledgement receipt, and caste/ category certificate wherever reservation is sought.
- **⊉** 25% of the total evaluation criteria will be composed of bonus marks added to the EHSET score according to the following chart:

- read and appreciate poetry and poetic technique;
- undertake free and/or guided composition; Further, Candidates will be assessed on the basis of their:
- rammatical competence and vocabulary;
- † reasoning ability;
- familiarity with literary texts, types and writers;
- ♦ awareness of social/cultural issues related to the study of literature; and ♦ reading habits, particularly in regard to Writing in English.

1. Read the following passage carefully and then *answer*, *as* far as possible in your own words, the questions that follow:

Then, at the school in Doomdooma, Okon discovered something unique and wonderful, something not only leading to another obsession, but also offering a peep hole into his own self. There was a 'library' in the school at Doomdooma—a couple of book-filled cupboards, the doors of which the headmaster always kept locked. He had no intention of letting his wards touch the books in case some were stolen, which might result in 'audit objection' next time there was an 'inspection' and some allotted books were found to be missing.—never mind that the higher authorities were least concerned about how many books were there in the 'library'. However, the very year Okon joined the school, the army-which had a base nearby-in one of its 'Public Relations (PR)'exercises, had donated a few lakh rupees for building a permanent room for the library, shelves, desks and benches, as also to buy quite a lot of new books. An officer had taken personal interest in what books should be purchased, and after its ceremonial opening, the headmaster had no option but to allow his students—at least those who were interested in doing so-to actually touch the books on the shelves, read them in the school premises and, horror of horrors, take them home for a few days. Okon had been one of the select few who were allowed to take library books

home. And thus began his slide into a different and magical world, which though created by someone else's imagination, was very much real in that of the child's.

Pitai had frowned at his youngest child's new fascination, but Ai and Bai approved, as did Hirukai. Okon would steal off to the back of the cowshed and, seated on the ground with his back to the mud-plastered wall, weep dryeyed at the plight of Tejimala, the little girl so cruelly treated by her stepmother, the antithesis of Ai, who loved Bai and Hirukai as though her own, or silently laugh at the craftiness of the monkey who deprived the quarrelling cats of their share of til pitha. Okon could now read in printed word the tales enacted through bhaona in the village naamghar; the stories were there in books such as Akonir Ramayana, Akonir Mahabharata or Akonir Purana. He would occasionally read such stories aloud to Ai and Bai, and sometimes, even Pitai would listen to him on the sly. Sometimes the books took them back far away to an antiquated time, when the devas, or gods waged war with the rakshyasas, those hideous ogres forever plotting to kill and maim and destroy; sometimes to far off Ayodhya, resplendent in the glimmer of a myriad earthen chakis as it awaited Rama's triumphant return. They would laugh together at Krishna's childhood pranks at Dwaraka. Ai and Bai knew such stories because they belonged to the oral tradition, but pretended they were hearing them for the first time and looked suitably amazed or amused.
